**The Commonwealth of Massachusetts**

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Nine.

AN ACT PROVIDING NO PUPIL SHALL BE REQUIRED TO ATTEND AN EXPERIMENTAL SCHOOL PROJECT UNLESS HIS PARENTS ASSENT THERETO.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 The seventh paragraph of section 1G of chapter 15 of the  
2 General Laws, added by section 1 of chapter 808 of the acts of  
3 1967, is hereby amended by adding the following sentence:  
4 No pupil shall be required to attend any such experimental  
5 school unless he has obtained the written consent of his par-  
6 ents or guardian.
