

HOUSE No. 1013

By Mr. Lewis of Boston, petition of Arthur J. Lewis, Jr., that school pupils sixteen years of age and older who have been suspended from school three times for misconduct be permanently excluded from school for any further misconduct without an opportunity to be heard before the school committee. AN ACT RELATING TO THE PERMANENT EXCLUSION FROM SCHOOL OF CERTAIN OFFENDERS WHO HAVE ATTAINED THE AGE OF SIXTEEN YEARS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 76 of the General Laws is hereby amended by
2 inserting after section 17 the following section:—

3 *Section 17A.* Any pupil who has attained the age of sixteen
4 and has thereafter been suspended from school three times
5 for misconduct shall not be further suspended but shall be
6 permanently excluded from school for any further misconduct
7 without an opportunity to be heard before the school com-
8 mittee.

The bill is intended to amend the law relating to the election of members of the House of Representatives, and to provide for the election of members of the House of Representatives in the year 1902.

The Constitution of the State of New York

As amended by the Convention of 1894 and 1895

ARTICLE III. OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK.

SECTION 1. The executive power shall be vested in the Governor of the State.
