## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE SALARY OF EMPLOYEES OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Paragraph one of section forty-six of chapter  
2 thirty of the General Laws is hereby amended by increasing  
3 the salary schedule, as most recently amended by section  
4 one of chapter five hundred and forty-seven of the acts of  
5 nineteen hundred and sixty-nine, by six dollars a week or  
6 six per cent, whichever is greater.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect as of July first,  
2 nineteen hundred and seventy.

**THE COMMUNALITY OF THE STATES**

In the Year 1880, the States of the Union

- 1. The States of the Union are divided into three classes: the first class consists of the States which have a population of more than one million; the second class consists of the States which have a population of more than five hundred thousand; and the third class consists of the States which have a population of less than five hundred thousand.
- 2. The States of the first class are divided into two subclasses: the first subclass consists of the States which have a population of more than two million; and the second subclass consists of the States which have a population of more than one million and less than two million.
- 3. The States of the second class are divided into two subclasses: the first subclass consists of the States which have a population of more than seven hundred thousand; and the second subclass consists of the States which have a population of more than five hundred thousand and less than seven hundred thousand.
- 4. The States of the third class are divided into two subclasses: the first subclass consists of the States which have a population of more than three hundred thousand; and the second subclass consists of the States which have a population of more than one hundred thousand and less than three hundred thousand.
