AN ACT REDUCING THE AGE REQUIREMENT FOR ELIGIBILITY BY
CERTAIN ELDERLY PERSONS FOR A TAX EXEMPTION.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in
General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as
follows:*

1 Clause Forty-first of section 5 of chapter 59 of the General

The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 8, Clause 18

1. Every individual of the United States shall have the right to peaceably assemble and to petition the Government for redress of grievances. This right shall be secured to every individual of the United States by the laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested in the Government of the United States by this Constitution.
