Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 72 of chapter 221 of the General Laws, as most
2 recently amended by section 4 of chapter 570 of the acts of
3 1964, is hereby further amended by inserting after the second
4 sentence the following sentence:—In Suffolk county officers
5 appointed as court officers to attend upon the sessions of any
6 court shall retire upon reaching sixty-five years of age.
