

HOUSE No. 4219

By Miss Howe of Somerville, petition of Marie E. Howe relative to the impounding of ballots in certain elections. Election Laws.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE IMPOUNDING OF BALLOTS IN CERTAIN ELECTIONS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 105 of chapter 54 of the General Laws, as most
2 recently amended by section 13 of chapter 564 of the acts of
3 1967, is hereby further amended by adding the following
4 paragraph:—

5 In any election wherein there is a difference of two per cent
6 or less in the count of the vote determining the nomination or
7 election of the candidates, said clerk shall immediately im-
8 pound the ballots and have them placed under police guard.
9 Said ballots shall be so guarded until the time for filing of
10 recounts has expired or a recount has been completed.
