## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy.

### AN ACT INCREASING THE PENSION OF CERTAIN RETIRED POLICE OFFICERS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. The second paragraph of section 83A of chapter 32  
2 of the General Laws, as most recently amended by section 1 of  
3 chapter 353 of the acts of 1964, is hereby further amended by  
4 striking out the second sentence and inserting in place thereof  
5 the following sentence:— Any member of said department  
6 retired under the provisions of subdivision (b), (c), or (d) of this  
7 section shall receive an annual pension equal to sixty per cent of  
8 the highest annual rate of compensation received by him while  
9 holding the grade held by him at the time of retirement, if he  
10 has completed twenty years of service, and an additional amount  
11 equal to one per cent of said annual compensation for each year  
12 of service after the first twenty.

1 SECTION 2. The provisions of section one of this act shall  
2 apply to all members retired before the effective date of this act.
