**AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE ATTENDANCE OF CERTAIN CHILDREN
IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF TOWNS OTHER THAN THE TOWNS IN
WHICH THEY RESIDE.**

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in
General Court assembled, and by authority of the same, as follows:*

- 1 The first paragraph of section 12A of chapter 76 of the
- 2 General Laws, as appearing in chapter 506 of the acts of 1966,
- 3 is hereby amended by inserting after the word "school", in line
- 4 5, the words: — or a school committee of any town may adopt
- 5 a plan for attendance in the public schools of said town where
- 6 such racial imbalance exists of students from another town
- 7 where such racial imbalance does not exist.

- 4 word "a school consisting of any town or ward," in the
- 5 place for attendance in the public schools of any town or ward
- 6 such town or ward, the words "or in any other town
- 7 where such school attendance does not exist."
