## **The Commonwealth of Massachusetts**

### **AN ACT PERTAINING TO POLICE OFFICERS RETIREMENT AFTER TWENTY YEARS SERVICE.**

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter 32, section 10 of the General Laws is hereby  
2 amended by adding after subsection (4) the following new  
3 subsection: —

4 (5) Notwithstanding the provisions of any other general or  
5 special law to the contrary any regular full time police officer  
6 of a city or town in the commonwealth who has completed  
7 twenty years of service may apply for retirement under the  
8 provisions of this subsection.

9 Any such police officer retired under the provisions of this  
10 subsection shall receive an annual pension equal to fifty per-  
11 cent of the highest annual rate of compensation received by  
12 him while holding the grade held by him at the time of  
13 retirement, if he has completed twenty years of service, and an  
14 additional amount equal to one percent of said annual compen-  
15 sation for each year of service after the first twenty.
