In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-One.

AN ACT GOVERNING TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 No person hired as a full time employee may be dismissed
- 2 from employment without written notice stating cause, shall be
- 3 allowed to work a month after receipt of said notice with a
- 4 week off with pay to seek employment. An employee must
- 5 give two weeks written notice before leaving his job.

The Constitution of Massachusetts

As amended to the 19th of January 1890

AN ACT TO REVISE THE CONSTITUTION OF MASSACHUSETTS

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in and for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, that the following be the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to have effect from and after the first day of January next.

I. The power shall be a full free republic, the laws shall be equal, without respect to persons, and the rights of the people shall be preserved. The Legislature shall be composed of a Senate and a House of Representatives, and shall have the power to pass laws, to impeach and remove officers, and to elect and remove judges. The Executive power shall be vested in a Governor, who shall have the power to execute the laws, to appoint and remove officers, and to pardon offenses. The Judicial power shall be vested in a Supreme Court, and in such inferior courts as the Legislature may establish. The Legislature shall have the power to alter or amend this Constitution.
