AN ACT RELATIVE TO MONITORING OF CERTAIN TELEPHONE CALLS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 44 of chapter 166 of the General Laws, as inserted
2 by section 2 of chapter 738 of the acts of 1968, is hereby
3 amended by adding the following paragraph: —
4 Notwithstanding any other provision of this section all court
5 orders and warrants issued by a judge of competent jurisdiction
6 which requires a telephone company to furnish an applicant
7 attorney general or applicant district attorney with informa-
8 tion, facilities or technical assistance necessary to accomplish
9 the interception ordered in the court order and warrant, shall
10 be reported according to the provisions of section ninety-nine
11 of chapter two hundred and seventy-two by said applicant
12 attorney general or applicant district attorney and a judge of
13 competent jurisdiction and it shall not be required that the
14 telephone company report such interception under this section.
