RESOLUTIONS MEMORIALIZING THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO ENACT LEGISLATION ESTABLISHING A THIRTY-TWO HOUR WORK WEEK.

1 *Whereas*, It would be desirable to provide to wage earners
2 on a uniform basis throughout the nation additional leisure
3 time; and

4 *Whereas*, It would help to stem the tide of inflation to
5 impede uniformly the wage-price spiral now prevalent through-
6 out the nation; therefore be it

7 *Resolved*, That the general court of Massachusetts hereby
8 respectfully urges the Congress of the United States to enact a
9 minimum wage law (1) prescribing a thirty-two hour work
10 week without increase in the minimum hourly wage, and (2)
11 providing an hourly wage for work on Saturdays and Sundays
12 of one and one half times such minimum; and be it further

13 *Resolved*, That a copy of these resolutions be transmitted
14 forthwith by the state secretary to the President of the United
15 States, to the presiding office of each branch of the Congress,
16 and to the members thereof from the commonwealth.
