AN ACT TO PERMIT CERTAIN VETERANS TO RETAIN A HANDICAPPED PERSON'S NUMBER PLATE UNTIL HE RECEIVES A DISABLED VETERAN'S PLATE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 2 of chapter 90 of the General Laws, as most
2 recently amended by section 1 of chapter 742 of the acts of
3 1969, is hereby further amended by inserting after the sixth
4 paragraph the following paragraph: —

5 Any member of the armed forces or any discharged member
6 of the armed forces who has not yet received his certification
7 from the Veterans Administration who owns and operates a
8 motor vehicle within the commonwealth and who suffers from
9 a disability which would entitle him to a handicapped person's
10 number plate may apply for such a license plate and may
11 retain it for one year after discharge or until he is properly
12 certified to receive a disabled veteran's plate, whichever period
13 is shorter.

REPORT OF THE

COMMISSIONERS OF THE LAND OFFICE

IN RESPONSE TO A RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE SENATE, FEBRUARY 1, 1906.

1. The Commission on the Land Office was organized on July 1, 1905, by the Senate.
2. Its first report was presented to the Senate on August 1, 1905.
3. It has since that time been engaged in a study of the land problem in this State.
4. It has held numerous public hearings and has received many suggestions from the people.
5. It has also conducted extensive investigations into the various phases of the land question.
6. The result of these investigations is embodied in this report.
7. It contains a full and complete statement of the facts and figures relating to the land problem.
8. It also contains a number of suggestions for the improvement of the land laws.
9. It is believed that these suggestions will be of great value to the State.
10. It is the hope of the Commission that this report will be of service to the people.
11. It is also the hope that it will lead to the enactment of wise and just laws.
12. It is signed by the Commissioners of the Land Office.
13. It is submitted to the Senate for its consideration.
14. It is respectfully requested that the Senate will take prompt action thereon.
