AN ACT TO ALLOW TWO PRIZES OF UNLIMITED AMOUNT
NIGHTLY IN THE GAME KNOWN AS BEANO.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 52 of chapter 147 of the General Laws is hereby
2 amended by striking out the fifth paragraph, as inserted by
3 section 3 of chapter 486 of the acts of 1971, and inserting in
4 place thereof the following paragraph: —

5 No licensee shall give more than two prizes nightly which
6 exceed fifty dollars in value, either in cash or merchandise.

The Conservation of Lands

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Nineteen

It is the duty of the State to conserve its lands for the benefit of its people. The Commission on the Conservation of Lands was organized in 1917 to study the problem of land conservation in this State. It has since that time held numerous public hearings and has received many suggestions from the people. It has also conducted extensive research into the various uses of land and the methods of conserving it. The Commission believes that the following principles should govern the conservation of land in this State:

1. That the State should acquire and hold all lands which are of public interest.
2. That the State should manage its lands in such a way as to secure the greatest benefit to the people.
3. That the State should protect its lands from all forms of waste and destruction.
4. That the State should encourage the use of land for agricultural and other productive purposes.
5. That the State should provide for the recreation and enjoyment of its people in its lands.
