AN ACT RELATIVE TO A FAIR AND JUST MINIMUM WAGE FOR TRAINEES AND MERCANTILE ESTABLISHMENTS, JANITORS, AND GOLF CADDIES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 7 of Chapter 151, as most recently
 2 amended by Chapter 752 of the Acts of 1972, is hereby
 3 amended by inserting after the word "employed" at the end of
 4 the sixth sentence the following: "and may be paid no less
 5 than seventy-five percent of the minimum wage rate estab-
 6 lished in section 1 of Chapter 151.

1 SECTION 2. Section 7 of Chapter 151 of the Acts of 1972 is
 2 amended by striking out the words "thirty-six dollars" and
 3 inserting in place thereof the words "fifty-one dollars and
 4 eighty cents."

1 SECTION 3. Section 7 of Chapter 151, as amended by Chap-
 2 ter 752 of the Acts of 1972 is amended by adding the following
 3 after the word "caddies" at the end of the first sentence, "who
 4 shall be paid the following minimum rates: 9 holes and under
 5 one dollar and a half per bag; ten to eighteen holes, three
 6 dollars per bag."

1 SECTION 4. Section 1A of Chapter 151, as most recently
 2 amended by Chapter 108 of the Acts of 1969, is hereby
 3 amended by striking out the words "thirty dollars" as they
 4 appear in subparagraph one and inserting in place, thereof,
 5 the words "fifty-one dollars and eighty cents."
