

*Chap. 83* AN ACT PROVIDING FOR TENURE OF OFFICE FOR THE INCUMBENT OF THE OFFICE OF CHIEF OF POLICE OF THE TOWN OF SALISBURY.

*Be it enacted, etc., as follows:*

SECTION 1. The tenure of office of Grant Morse the incumbent of the office of chief of police of the town of Salisbury shall, upon the effective date of this act, be unlimited. Said incumbent shall not be removed from office, lowered in rank or suspended, except for just cause and for reasons specifically given him in writing by the board of selectmen.

SECTION 2. This act shall be submitted to the voters of said town at the annual town meeting in the year nineteen hundred and fifty-seven in the form of the following question, which shall be placed upon the official ballot to be used for the election of town officers at said meeting:—“Shall an act passed by the General Court in the year nineteen hundred and fifty-seven, entitled ‘An act providing for tenure of office for the incumbent of the office of chief of police of the town of Salisbury’, be accepted?” If a majority of the votes cast in answer to said question is in the affirmative, this act shall take full effect, but not otherwise.

SECTION 3. For purposes of acceptance only this act shall take effect upon its passage.

*Chap. 84* AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE TRUSTEES OF CLARK UNIVERSITY TO HOLD ADDITIONAL REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY.

*Be it enacted, etc., as follows:*

Trustees of Clark University, incorporated by chapter one hundred and thirty-three of the acts of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, is hereby authorized to hold, for the purposes of its incorporation, real and personal property to an amount not exceeding twenty-five million dollars.

*Chap. 85* AN ACT INCREASING THE FEES OF COURT STENOGRAPHERS FOR FURNISHING TRANSCRIPTS OF THEIR NOTES.

*Be it enacted, etc., as follows:*

Section 88 of chapter 221 of the General Laws, as amended by chapter 179 of the acts of 1947, is hereby further amended by striking out, in lines 4 and 5, the word “twenty-five” and inserting in place thereof the word: — thirty.
