

HOUSE No. 3100

By Mr. McCarthy of Peabody, petition of Peter C. McCarthy that the School Building Assistance Bureau be authorized to reimburse cities, towns, counties and regional school districts for the costs incurred for topographical surveys necessitated by school construction programs.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE STATE SCHOOL ASSISTANCE BUILDING BUREAU TO REIMBURSE CITIES, TOWNS, COUNTIES AND REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICTS 100% OF THE COST INCURRED BY SAID SCHOOL DISTRICTS FOR TOPOGRAPHICAL SURVEYS NECESSITATED BY SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAMS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 State school assistance building authority is hereby authorized
- 2 and directed to reimburse cities, towns, counties and regional
- 3 school districts 100% of the cost incurred by said school districts
- 4 for topographical surveys necessitated by school construction
- 5 programs.

The Commission was created by Public Law 85-513, 85 Stat. 1001, July 27, 1968, and reauthorized by Public Law 95-474, 90 Stat. 1717, October 10, 1976, and Public Law 96-359, 90 Stat. 500, October 10, 1976. The Commission's mandate was to study and report on the administration of the Government of the District of Columbia, with particular emphasis on the organization, management, and personnel of the District Government.

The Commission has held numerous public hearings and has received many suggestions and criticisms from the public. It has also conducted extensive research and analysis of the District Government's operations.

The Commission's report is organized into three main parts: (1) a description of the District Government's current organization and management; (2) a discussion of the problems and challenges facing the District Government; and (3) a set of recommendations for reforming the District Government's administration.
