## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Four.

### AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE CRIME OF TRESPASS BY A MOTOR VEHICLE AND PROVIDING FOR THE REMOVAL OF SUCH VEHICLES.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter 266 of the General Laws is hereby amended by  
2 inserting after section 120C the following section: —  
3 *Section 120D.* Whoever, without right parks a motor vehicle  
4 upon a private way or upon improved land, after having been  
5 forbidden so to do by the person who has lawful control of said  
6 improved land, either directly or by notice posted thereon, shall  
7 be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars or  
8 by imprisonment for not more than six months, or both. The  
9 motor vehicle found committing such trespass shall be removed  
10 and stored in any convenient place in said city or town by an  
11 independent contractor at no expense to and without any  
12 liability on said city or town upon the direction of any officer in  
13 charge of a police station in said city or town. In addition to any  
14 other penalty for such offense the registered owner of such  
15 motor vehicle shall be liable for charges for removal and storage  
16 of said motor vehicle; provided, however, that the liability so  
17 imposed for removal and storage shall not exceed the amounts  
18 authorized under section two of chapter two hundred and  
19 sixty-three of the acts of nineteen hundred and twenty-nine, as  
20 amended.
