AN ACT TO PROVIDE THAT THE FORM USED FOR GIVING NOTICE TO THE INSPECTOR OF WIRES SHALL BE UNIFORM THROUGHOUT THE COMMONWEALTH.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Paragraph 4 of Section 3L of Chapter 143 shall be amended  
2 by adding after the first sentence the following: — Said no-  
3 tice shall be given by mailing or delivering a permit applica-  
4 tion form to said Inspector of Wires. The permit application  
5 form shall be devised by the Board of Fire Prevention Reg-  
6 ulations prior to December 31, 1977 and shall be uniform in  
7 all cities and towns of the Commonwealth.
