RESOLUTIONS MEMORIALIZING THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO APPROVE LEGISLATION TO DETER THE THEFT OF CITIZENS' BAND RADIO EQUIPMENT.

Whereas, the citizens of Massachusetts are rightly disturbed over the great number of thefts of citizens' band radio equipment; and

Whereas, the regulation of the use of citizens' band radio equipment is within the purview of the Federal government; and

Whereas, the improper or unauthorized use of citizens' band radio equipment may be punished according to Federal law so as to deter thefts thereof; therefore be it

Resolved, that the Massachusetts State Senate respectfully urges the Congress of the United States to approve legislaion designed to deter the theft of citizens' band radio equipment; and be it further

Resolved, that copies of these resolutions be forwarded by the Secretary of the Commonwealth to the President of the United States, to the presiding officer of each branch of Congress, and to the members thereof from this Commonwealth.
