AN ACT PROVIDING FOR NOMINATION OF ONE MEMBER OF THE
SPRINGFIELD HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION BY A NON-PROFIT
ORGANIZATION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 297 of the acts of 1975 is hereby
 - 2 amended by inserting after section 1 the following section: —
 - 3 *Section 1A.* Notwithstanding the provisions of section four
 - 4 of chapter forty C of the General Laws, the city of Spring-
 - 5 field may, by ordinance, provide for the appointment by its
 - 6 mayor, subject to confirmation by the city council of said city,
 - 7 of a member of its historic district commission from two nom-
 - 8 inees submitted by the Springfield Preservation Trust Incor-
 - 9 porated, a non-profit organization having as its purpose the
 - 10 preservation and protection of properties in the city of Spring-
 - 11 field which may have architectural or historical significance.
- 1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

It is the duty of the Senate to report to the House of Representatives the results of its deliberations on the bills and resolutions passed by the House, and to recommend such amendments as may be necessary for the better consideration of the same.

As the Senate of the United States is organized for the purpose of advising and consenting to the measures proposed by the House of Representatives, it is the duty of the Senate to report to the House the results of its deliberations on the bills and resolutions passed by the House, and to recommend such amendments as may be necessary for the better consideration of the same.

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1. To advise and consent to the measures proposed by the House of Representatives.
2. To report to the House the results of its deliberations on the bills and resolutions passed by the House, and to recommend such amendments as may be necessary for the better consideration of the same.
3. To advise and consent to the ratification of treaties made by the President.
4. To advise and consent to the appointment and removal of judges, officers, and consuls.
5. To advise and consent to the appointment and removal of ambassadors, ministers, and consuls.
