Reilly for legislation to further regulate excavations; the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 739) of Carol C. Amick for legislation to enhance accountability and financial responsibility in the performance of contracts for sale; the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 877) of Arthur Joseph Lewis, Jr., for legislation to further regulate certain gambling devices; the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 879) of Arthur Joseph Lewis, Jr., for legislation relative to the requirements for the issuance of a license to practice electrolysis to persons licensed or registered under the laws of any other state; the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 880) of Arthur Joseph Lewis, Jr., for legislation to repeal the certification of Frederick A. In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty-Five.

Ordered. That the Joint Committee on Government Regulations be authorized and directed to make an investigation and study of the issues pertaining to legislation affecting the licensing of various trades and professions. The Committee shall study and report on current Senate documents numbered 37, 151, 165, 171, 739, 877, 879, 880, 896, 1545, 1557, and 1568 and House document numbered 2536.

Said Committee shall be provided with quarters in the State House or elsewhere, may hold public hearings, may travel within the Commonwealth, and may expend for clerical and other services and expenses such sums as may be appropriated therefor. Said Committee shall report to the General Court the results of its investigation and study, and its recommendation if any, together with the drafts of such legislation necessary to carry such recommendations into effect by filing the same with the Clerk of the Senate on or before the first Wednesday of December, Nineteen Hundred and Eighty-Five.
