The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty-Six.

AN ACT FURTHER REGULATING THE ISSUANCE OF CERTAIN LICENSES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The first paragraph of section 71G of chapter 143
2 of the General Laws, as most recently amended by sections 170 and
3 271 of chapter 572 of the acts of 1980, is hereby further amended by
4 striking out the sixth sentence and inserting in place thereof the
5 following sentences: —
6 Licenses shall be valid throughout the Commonwealth but shall
7 not be assignable or transferable. A license shall continue in force
8 until the date of birth of the licensee occurring more than twelve
9 months but not more than twenty-four months after the date of
10 such license unless suspended or revoked for incompetence or
11 untrustworthiness of the licensee. If any such license or the renewal
12 thereof expires in an even year, any subsequent renewal shall
13 expire on the next anniversary of the licensee's date of birth
14 occurring in an even year. If any such license or renewal thereof
15 expires in an odd year any subsequent renewal shall expire on the
16 next anniversary of the licensee's date of birth occurring in an odd
17 year. A license issued to a person born on February twenty-ninth
18 shall for the purposes of this section expire on March first.
19 Licenses not renewed at the expiration date shall become void, and
20 shall after one year be reinstated only by reexamination of the
21 licensee. A notice of the date of expiration of a license shall, at least
22 thirty days prior to such date, be sent to the licensee.

1 SECTION 2. Section 71G of chapter 143 of the General Laws,
2 as most recently amended by section 272 of chapter 572 of the acts

3 of 1980 is hereby further amended by inserting after the fifth
4 sentence the following sentence: —

5 Licenses not renewed at the expiration date shall become void,
6 and shall after one year be reinstated only by reexamination of the
7 licensee.

1 SECTION 3. Section 75 of chapter 143 of the General Laws, as
2 most recently amended by section 275 of chapter 572 of the acts of
3 1980, is hereby further amended by striking out the fourth sentence
4 and inserting in place thereof the following seven sentences: —

5 Licenses shall be valid throughout the Commonwealth but shall
6 not be assignable or transferable. A license shall continue in force
7 until the date of birth of the licensee occurring more than twelve
8 months but not more than twenty-four months after the date of
9 such license unless suspended or revoked for incompetence or
10 untrustworthiness of the licensee. If any such license or the renewal
11 thereof expires in an even year, any subsequent renewal shall
12 expire on the next anniversary of the licensee's date of birth
13 occurring in an even year. If any such license or renewal thereof
14 expires in an odd year any subsequent renewal shall expire on the
15 next anniversary of the licensee's date of birth occurring in an odd
16 year. A license issued to a person born on February twenty-ninth
17 shall for the purpose of this section expire on March first. Licenses
18 not renewed at the expiration date shall become void, and shall
19 after one year be reinstated only by reexamination of the licensee.
20 A notice of the date of the expiration of a license shall, at least
21 thirty days prior to such date, be sent to the licensee.

1 SECTION 4. Section 85 of chapter 146 of the General laws, as
2 most recently amended by section 291 of chapter 572 of the acts of
3 1980 is hereby further amended by striking out the last sentence of
4 the second paragraph and inserting in place thereof the following
5 such sentences: —

6 Licenses shall be valid throughout the Commonwealth but shall
7 not be assignable or transferable. A license shall continue in force
8 until the date of birth of the licensee occurring more than twelve
9 months but not more than twenty-four months after the date of
10 such license unless suspended or revoked for incompetence or

11 untrustworthiness of the licensee. If any such license or the renewal
12 thereof expires in an even year, any subsequent renewal shall
13 expire on the next anniversary of the licensee's date of birth
14 occurring in an even year. If any such license or renewal thereof
15 expires in an odd year, any subsequent renewal shall expire on the
16 next anniversary of the licensee's date of birth occurring in an odd
17 year. A license issued to a person on February twenty-ninth shall
18 for the purpose of this section expire on March first. Licenses not
19 renewed at the expiration date shall become void, and shall after
20 one year be reinstated only by reexamination of the licensee. A
21 notice of the date of expiration of a license shall, at least thirty
22 days prior to such date, be sent to the licensee.

1 SECTION 5. The first paragraph of section 10D of chapter 148
2 of the General Laws, as most recently amended by section 296 of
3 chapter 572 of the acts of 1980, is hereby further amended by
4 striking out the last sentence and inserting in place thereof the
5 following sentence: —

6 Licenses not renewed at the expiration date shall become void,
7 and shall after one year be reinstated only by reexamination of the
8 licensee. A notice of the date of expiration of a license shall, at least
9 thirty days prior to such date, be sent to the licensee.

1 SECTION 6. Section 20B of chapter 148 of the General Laws,
2 as most recently amended by sections 300, 301, and 302 of chapter
3 572 of the acts of 1980 is hereby further amended by inserting after
4 the ninth sentence the following sentence: —

5 Licenses not renewed at the expiration date shall become void,
6 and shall after one year be reinstated only by reexamination of the
7 licensee. A notice of the date of expiration of a licensee shall, at
8 least thirty days prior to such date, be sent to the licensee.
