RESOLUTIONS MEMORIALIZING THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO PASS LEGISLATION PROVIDING FOR MINIMUM COMPULSORY AUTOMOBILE INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR VEHICLES INVOLVED IN INTERSTATE TRAVEL.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 *Whereas*, many automobile accidents in the commonwealth
- 2 involve out of state underinsured and uninsured vehicles, and
- 3 *Whereas*, there is no legal way which the commonwealth can
- 4 require out of state vehicles using our roads to be insured or
- 5 inspected, therefore be it
- 6 *Resolved*, That the house of representatives urges the Congress
- 7 of the United States to enact legislation requiring all motor vehicles
- 8 involved in interstate travel to have a reasonable amount of liability and property damage insurance coverage and be inspected for
- 9 safe operation at least yearly in the state in which such vehicle is
- 10 registered.
