RESOLVE INCREASING THE SCOPE OF THE SPECIAL COMMISSION ESTABLISHED TO MAKE AN INVESTIGATION AND STUDY RELATIVE TO ALCOHOL AND DRUG EDUCATION.

1 *Resolved*, That the special commission, established by section
2 twenty-two of chapter two hundred and forty-one of the acts of
3 nineteen hundred and eighty-one and most recently revived and
4 continued by chapter one of the resolves of nineteen hundred and
5 eighty-five, shall, in the course of its investigation and study,
6 consider the subject matter of current senate documents numbered
7 305, relative to the use of intoxicating liquor or controlled sub-
8 stances by public school students; 306, mandating that driver
9 education courses include instruction in the dangers of driving
10 under the influence of alcohol and controlled substances; 312,
11 providing up-to-date factual drug education statewide; 313, requir-
12 ing anonymous drug survey in grades seven through twelve in
13 public schools, and in state colleges; S.1759, concerning instruc-
14 tional programs on the nature and effects of alcohol and alco-
15 holism and programs relative to alcohol-related problems in
16 schools; and of current house documents numbered 954, providing
17 a fund for certain alcohol and drug abuse programs; 1082, relative
18 to drug and alcohol education in the public school system; 2193,
19 requiring programs of preventive education in alcohol and drug
20 use in the public schools; 2767, resolve for an investigation and
21 study relative to alcohol and drug abuse education in the primary
22 and secondary schools in the commonwealth; 2966, requiring drug
23 and alcohol abuse programs in the public schools; 3152, concern-
24 ing instructional programs on the nature and effects of alcohol and
25 alcoholism and programs relative to alcohol-related problems in
26 school; 3154, relative to the development of a policy for dealing
27 with students who are under the influence of intoxicating liquor or
28 controlled substances in the public schools; 3155, mandating that
29 driver education courses include comprehensive instruction in the

30 dangers of driving under the influence of alcohol and/or controlled
31 substances; 3156, providing up-to-date, factual drug education
32 statewide; 3157, requiring anonymous drug surveys in grades seven
