## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty-Six.

### AN ACT FURTHER REGULATING PENALTIES FOR MINOR MOTOR VEHICLE OFFENSES.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 90C of the General Laws, as most  
2 recently amended by Section 1 of Chapter 35 of the Acts of 1986,  
3 is hereby further amended by deleting the words "provided,  
4 however, that these shall be the only alternatives available to the  
5 violator:" as appearing in lines 20 and 21 of said Section 1 of  
6 Chapter 35 of the Acts of 1986.

1 SECTION 2. Chapter 90C of the General Laws, as most  
2 recently amended by Section 1 of Chapter 35 of the Acts of 1986,  
3 is hereby further amended by adding the following paragraph after  
4 the third paragraph in said Section 1 of Chapter 35 of the Acts  
5 of 1986:  
6 "The violator may also elect to attend an alternative traffic school  
7 approved by the presiding justice of the judicial district in which  
8 the violation occurred; Provided that attendance at said  
9 alternative traffic school shall be permitted only after a request  
10 is made by the violator not more than 20 days after the date of  
11 the violation either in person or in writing to the clerk-magistrate;  
12 and provided further that said request must be approved by the  
13 clerk-magistrate."

1 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

Section 1. That the following be and they are hereby declared to be the official seal of the State of New York:

The seal shall be a shield, the top of which shall be a scroll, on which shall be inscribed the motto of the State, 'EUREKA'.

The shield shall be divided into three parts, the upper part being a triangle, the lower part being a rectangle.

In the triangle shall be a sun rising over a bay, with a ship on the water, and a plow in the foreground.

In the rectangle shall be a sheaf of wheat, a bundle of cotton, and a sheaf of corn.

In the center of the shield shall be a sailing ship on the sea, with a plow in the foreground.

The shield shall be surrounded by a wreath of olive and oak branches.

The shield shall be supported by two figures, a man and a woman, representing Liberty and Justice.

The shield shall be surmounted by a crest, consisting of a wreath and a plow.

SECTION 2. That the seal of the State of New York shall be used in all official documents.
