AN ACT ESTABLISHING A COUNCIL OF HEALTH PROFESSIONS AND OCCUPATIONS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- Chapter 13 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after Section 8 the following section: -

in the performance of their duties. The council shall annually elect 22 23 a chairman from its members. The council shall meet at least four times annually and upon call of the chairman or written applica-24 25 tion to the chairman of any three members. The council shall adopt 26 operating procedures governing the conduct of its activities, and 27 have the authority to establish subcommittees whenever their formation would further the council's achievement of its mandate 28

The council, subject to appropriation, shall receive such administrative, clerical and logistical support as it needs to perform its duties from the division of registration established under section eight of this chapter. The director of the division shall act as secretary of the council.

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The council shall, consistent with criteria enumerated hereafter in this section, establish procedures for the identification of health services occupations not now registered or licensed, recommend appropriate regulatory modes, and transmit its findings together with any proposed legislation it may deem necessary to the governor, the secretary of consumer affairs and to the general court. The council shall also mediate conflicts within and between the boards whose designees are members of it and issue advisory opinions and recommendations to the board who are in conflict. When a dispute remains unresolved after mediation and recommendation by the 44 council, and the council believes the dispute merits further consid-45 eration, it shall transmit its findings and recommendations to the governor, the secretary of consumer affairs, and the general court. 46 47

In determining whether a health occupation or profession shall hereafter be regulated, the council shall consider the following factors: a) In what way will the unregulated practice of the occupation clearly endanger the health, safety, and welfare of the public, and is the potential for harm easily recognizable and not remote or dependent on tenuous argument? b) How will the newly licensed category impact upon the statutory and administrative authority and scope of practice of previously licensed categories in the state? c) Is the scope of practice of the occupation distinguishable from that of other licensed and unlicensed occupations? d) Does the practice of the occupation require specialized skill or training and does the public need assurance of initial and continuing occupational ability? e) Can the citizens of this state be effectively pro-
