AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE SALARIES OF CHIEF PROBATION OFFICERS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 99D of Chapter 276 of the General Laws, as most
2 recently amended by Chapter 632 of the Acts of 1981, is further
3 amended as follows: —

4 (a) In those courts or regions having less than five probation
5 officers, a chief probation officer shall be paid a salary equal to
6 step 7 of level 19 of the Personnel Classification and Compensation
7 Plan of the Massachusetts Trial Court.

8 (b) In those courts or regions with 5 to 14 probation officers, a
9 chief probation officer or acting chief probation officer shall be
10 paid a salary equal to step 7 of level 20 of the Personnel Classification
11 and Compensation Plan of the Massachusetts Trial Court.

12 (c) In those courts or regions with fifteen or more probation
13 officers, a chief probation officer or acting chief probation officer
14 shall be paid a salary equal to step 7 of level 21 of the Personnel
15 Classification and Compensation Plan of the Massachusetts Trial
16 Court.

The Constitution of the State

Section 1. The judicial power shall be vested in the Supreme Court and in such inferior courts as may be established by law.

Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of five judges, one of whom shall be the Chief Justice.

Section 3. The judges of the Supreme Court shall hold their offices for the term of ten years, and shall be eligible for re-election.

Section 4. The judges of the Supreme Court shall be elected by the people at the general election, and shall hold office until the next general election.
