By Mr. Lewis, a petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 1293) of Arthur Joseph Lewis, Jr., for legislation to authorize a chief of police to continue his tenure beyond the age of seventy. Public Service.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING A CHIEF OF POLICE TO CONTINUE HIS TENURE
BEYOND THE AGE OF SEVENTY.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Notwithstanding the provisions of any other general or special
- 2 law to the contrary, a chief of police in a city or town may elect to
- 3 extend the tenure of his office beyond the age of seventy so long as
- 4 such chief otherwise qualifies for such position.

The Senate has received a bill from the House of Representatives, which is entitled "An Act to amend the Act of March 2, 1907, relating to the duties of the Secretary of the Senate."

The Committee on the Senate

has the honor to report to the Senate the following bill:

That the Secretary of the Senate shall be authorized to receive and disburse the moneys of the Senate, and to sign checks and warrants for the same.

It is recommended that the bill be passed with amendments.

The bill is reported to the Senate with amendments, which are as follows: 1. To amend the title of the bill to read "An Act to amend the Act of March 2, 1907, relating to the duties of the Secretary of the Senate, and to provide for the payment of the salaries of the Secretary and the Clerks of the Senate." 2. To amend the first section of the bill to read "The Secretary of the Senate shall be authorized to receive and disburse the moneys of the Senate, and to sign checks and warrants for the same, and to employ such clerks as may be necessary for the proper discharge of his duties." 3. To amend the second section of the bill to read "The Secretary of the Senate shall be authorized to employ such clerks as may be necessary for the proper discharge of his duties, and the salaries of such clerks shall be paid out of the moneys of the Senate."
