AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE RESTRAINING OF DOGS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, no
- 2 dog shall be restrained on a line that provides for a run of less than
- 3 twenty-five feet or in a pen of less than four by six feet for small
- 4 dogs, six by eight feet for medium dogs, or eight by twelve feet for
- 5 large dogs.

Approved by the Senate on the 10th day of June 1902.
