AN ACT REGARDING STATE INCOME TAX.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 That income of persons in the armed forces of the United States
- 2 who are stationed outside of the commonwealth be exempt from
- 3 the state income tax.

of the House of Representatives of the United States of America, in the first session of the Sixty-ninth Congress, to which the following bills were introduced, and which were read twice and passed on the 1st day of December, 1905:

The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 2, Clause 3

Section 3

It is the duty of the President to see that the laws are faithfully executed.

1. The President shall have the honor and respect of the United States.
2. He shall be the commander in chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, and he may call them forth to execute the laws of the United States, to suppress insurrections and to repel invasions.
3. He may grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.
