AN ACT FURTHER DEFINING ELIGIBLE LIST AS USED IN THE CIVIL SERVICE LAW.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 12 of chapter 31 of the General Laws, as most re-
- 2 cently amended by chapter 241 of the acts of 1964, is hereby
- 3 further amended by adding the following paragraph: —
- 4 An eligible list as used in this section and elsewhere in this
- 5 chapter shall consist of each person eligible to any position
- 6 as determined by the director after examination, and may con-
- 7 sist of the name of only one such person and so long as one
- 8 name remains on the eligible list no provisional appointment
- 9 shall be made under section five so long as there is a requisition
- 10 for a person from said list.

constitution of the University of Michigan.
