AN ACT EXTENDING THE TIME WITHIN WHICH CERTAIN APPEALS  
MAY BE HEARD BY LESS THAN A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS OF  
THE CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

1 *Whereas*, The deferred operation of this act would tend to  
2 defeat its purpose, which is to make permanent the provisions  
3 of law authorizing certain appeals to be heard by less than a  
4 majority of the civil service commission, therefore, it is hereby  
5 declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate  
6 preservation of the public convenience.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in  
General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as  
follows:*

1 Paragraph (b) of section 2 of chapter 31 of the General Laws,  
2 as most recently amended by chapter 720 of the acts of 1964, is  
3 hereby further amended by striking out the second and third  
4 sentences and inserting in place thereof the following sentence:—  
5 Hearings on any appeal may be held before less than a majority  
6 of the commission, or the chairman may assign a member or  
7 members to hold such hearings and to report his or their find-  
8 ings of fact and recommendations to the commission for action.
