RESOLVE PROVIDING FOR AN INVESTIGATION AND STUDY BY A SPECIAL COMMISSION RELATIVE TO THE MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE.

1 *Resolved*, That a special commission, to consist of two mem-
2 bers of the senate, three members of the house of representatives
3 and three persons to be appointed by the governor, is hereby
4 established for the purpose of making an investigation and
5 study relative to the Middlesex county extension service with
6 particular reference to personnel practices, and financial matters
7 and any other related matters thereto. Said commission
8 shall report to the general court on or before the first Wednesday
9 of April in the current year.

The Constitution of the State

In the Year 1870

Article I. The Legislative Power shall be vested in a Senate and a House of Representatives. The Senate shall be composed of twelve members, six from each district, to be chosen for the term of six years, one-third to retire each year. The House of Representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several counties, and the number shall not exceed one for every ten thousand persons. The Legislature shall assemble annually on the first Monday in January, and shall continue its session until the first day of December following. It shall have the power to pass bills for raising revenue, to regulate commerce, to define crimes, to declare war, to make and alter the rules of the Senate and House, and to impeach and try officers of the State. The Senate shall have the sole power to confirm or reject appointments made by the Governor, and to ratify or reject treaties made by the Governor. The House shall have the sole power to impeach and try officers of the State, and to remove them from office. The Legislature shall have the power to create, alter, or abolish any office of the State, and to determine the qualifications and duties of the officers thereof.
