

HOUSE No. 1395

By Mr. Rogers of New Bedford, petition of George Rogers that candidates for public office be restricted to news media and use of motor vehicles in advertising their candidacy. Election Laws.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Nine.

AN ACT RESTRICTING THE ADVERTISING BY CANDIDATES FOR PUBLIC OFFICE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The provisions of any general or special law to
2 the contrary notwithstanding, it shall be unlawful for any
3 candidate for a town, city, county, state or national office to
4 advertise his candidacy for such office except through the
5 news media or by use of motor vehicles operating on the
6 public ways of the commonwealth.

1 SECTION 2. The violation of the provisions of the statute
2 shall result in a fine of one hundred dollars for each offense.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE COMMISSION OF THE STATE FOR THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND FIVE.

Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the State, as follows:

1. Section 1. The provisions of any general or special law to the contrary notwithstanding, it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle on any highway, street or public way in this State, or to use a motor vehicle on any highway, street or public way in this State, except through the provisions of the laws of this State.

2. Section 2. The violation of the provisions of the statute shall result in a fine of one hundred dollars for each offense.
