AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE ELIGIBILITY OF PRISONERS FOR PAROLE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 127 of the General Laws is hereby amended by
2 striking out section 133, as most recently amended by chapter
3 764 of the acts of 1965, and inserting in place thereof the
4 following section:—

5 *Section 133.* Parole permits may be granted by the parole
6 board to prisoners subject to its jurisdiction at such times as
7 the board in each case may determine; provided, that no
8 prisoner held under a sentence containing a minimum sen-
9 tence shall receive a parole permit until he shall have served
10 two thirds of such minimum sentence, but in any event not
11 less than one year, or, if he has two or more sentences to be
12 served otherwise than concurrently, two thirds of the aggre-
13 gate of the minimum terms of such several sentences, but in
14 any event not less than one year for each such sentence. Such
15 minimum term shall be computed after allowing for deduc-
16 tions for good conduct as provided in section one hundred
17 and twenty-nine of this chapter; and shall be reduced by the
18 number of days allowed for blood donations as provided in
19 section one hundred and twenty-nine A.
