AN ACT RELATIVE TO AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF BOSTON TO SELL TO THE COMMONWEALTH A PARCEL OF PARK LAND ON EVANS WAY IN SAID CITY FOR STATE COLLEGE PURPOSES.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any contrary provisions of  
2 general or special laws, the city of Boston acting by and  
3 through its parks and recreation commission, with the ap-  
4 proval of the mayor, is hereby authorized to sell and convey  
5 to the commonwealth of Massachusetts board of trustees of  
6 state colleges, the whole or any part of a certain parcel of land  
7 now held for park purposes which parcel is that portion of the  
8 existing Evans Way extending from Huntington Avenue in a  
9 Northeasterly direction plus or minus Two Hundred Forty  
10 feet to the Southerly line of Tetlow Street and Evans Way  
11 constituting approximately Nineteen Thousand Nine Hun-  
12 dred square feet.

1 SECTION 2. Notwithstanding any contrary provisions of  
2 general or special laws, the city of Boston acting by and  
3 through its parks and recreation commission with the ap-  
4 proval of the mayor, is hereby authorized to sell and convey  
5 to the Boston Redevelopment Authority the whole or any part  
6 of a certain parcel of land now held for park purposes which  
7 parcel is that portion of land beginning at the Westerly side  
8 line of the existing Evans Way and extending Two Hundred  
9 Fifteen feet in an Easterly direction along the Northerly

10 side line of Huntington Avenue to the Easterly side line of the  
11 existing Evans Way, said parcel to be approximately nine feet  
12 in width and constituting approximately One Thousand Eight  
13 Hundred square feet to be used for the purpose of widening  
14 Huntington avenue.

1 SECTION 3. Notwithstanding any contrary provisions of  
2 general or special laws, the commonwealth of Massachusetts  
3 board of trustees of state colleges is hereby authorized to sell  
4 and convey to the parks and recreation commission of the city  
5 of Boston, the whole or any part of a certain parcel of land  
6 now held for educational purposes or otherwise which parcel  
7 is located near the Easterly line of said property and extends  
8 from the Southerly line of Evans Way in a Southerly direction  
9 plus or minus One Hundred Twenty Five feet to the Northerly  
10 line of Huntington Avenue, said parcel to be approximately  
11 Sixty feet in width and constituting approximately Eight  
12 Thousand Three Hundred square feet, said parcel to be used  
13 by the parks and recreation commission for street purposes.

1 SECTION 4. Notwithstanding any contrary provisions of  
2 general or special laws, the commonwealth of Massachusetts  
3 board of trustees of state colleges is hereby authorized to sell  
4 and convey to the Boston Redevelopment Authority the whole  
5 or any part of a certain parcel of land now held for educa-

8 side line of Huntington Avenue and extends Easterly plus  
9 or minus Two Hundred Eighty feet to the present Westerly  
10 side line of the existing Evans Way, said parcel to average  
11 Eleven feet in width and constitute approximately Two  
12 Thousand Seven Hundred square feet, said parcel to be used  
13 for the purposes of widening Huntington avenue.

4 and convey to the Boston Redevelopment Authority the whole
