AN ACT INCREASING THE PENALTY FOR THE SALE OF MASTER KEYS FOR MOTOR VEHICLES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 260 of the General Laws is hereby amended by
2 striking out section 140, as most recently amended by section 2
3 chapter 269 of the acts of 1966, and inserting in place thereof
4 the following section:—

5 *Section 140.* Whoever sells a master key designed to fit more
6 than one motor vehicle knowing, or having reasonable cause to
7 believe that said key will be used for an illegal purpose, shall
8 be punished by a fine of not more than one thousand dollars
9 or by imprisonment for not more than two years of both.
