AN ACT RELATIVE TO INVESTIGATING INSURANCE COMPANIES TO DETERMINE IF THEIR INVESTMENTS AND REAL ESTATE HOLDINGS ARE IN COMPLIANCE WITH CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF THE GENERAL LAWS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 The commissioner of insurance and the district attorney  
2 for Suffolk county, acting as a joint board, are hereby au-  
3 thorized and directed to make an investigation and study of  
4 insurance companies, relative to the investing and depositing  
5 of funds in other than their corporate names and also to  
6 determine if the real estate holdings of any insurance com-  
7 pany are in excess of that allowed by chapter one hundred  
8 and seventy-five of the General Laws of Massachusetts.

#### Final Report: The Administration of the Federal Courts

The Commission on the Administration of Justice was established by Public Law 90-1, 81 Stat. 1, on January 3, 1967. Its mandate was to study the administration of the Federal courts and to recommend ways to improve the efficiency and economy of the Federal judicial system.

The Commission's report is divided into two main parts. The first part, "The Federal Courts: A General Overview," provides a comprehensive survey of the Federal judicial system. The second part, "Recommendations for Reform," sets forth the Commission's proposals for improving the administration of the Federal courts.

The Commission's recommendations are based on a number of key principles. First, the Commission believes that the Federal courts should be organized and operated in a way that is consistent with the needs of the public. Second, the Commission believes that the Federal courts should be managed in a way that is efficient and economical. Third, the Commission believes that the Federal courts should be staffed and operated in a way that is consistent with the highest standards of judicial independence and integrity.
