AN ACT DEFINING DISORDERLY CONDUCT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 53 of chapter 272 of the General Laws, as most
2 recently amended by section 1 of chapter 304 of the acts of 1959,
3 is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following
4 paragraph:—

5 A person is disorderly if (1) he refuses to comply with a lawful
6 order of a police officer or officer qualified to serve criminal
7 process to move from a public place, or if he creates in a public
8 place a hazardous condition by any act which is dangerous to
9 life, person or property and which serves no lawful purpose;
10 or if (2) with a purpose to cause public inconvenience, annoy-
11 ance or alarm, or recklessly creating a risk thereof he (a) engages
12 in fighting or in violent, tumultuous or threatening behavior, or
13 (b) makes unreasonably loud noises; or if (3) in a public place, he
14 (a) addresses abusive, indecent or obscene language or makes
15 abusive, indecent or obscene gestures to any person present, or
16 (b) obstructs vehicular or pedestrian traffic, (c) commits an act
17 offensive to the ordinary standards of sanitation, or any act
18 which results in a physically offensive condition.
