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## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Nine.

AN ACT REQUIRING THAT A PERSON ENGAGED IN SELLING, REPAIRING, REBUILDING OR EXCHANGING NEW OR USED WEIGHING AND MEASURING DEVICES GIVE CERTAIN NOTIFICATION TO WEIGHTS AND MEASURES OFFICIALS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter 98 of the General Laws is hereby amended by  
2 inserting after section 52 the following section:—  
3 *Section 52A.* Any person engaged in selling, repairing,  
4 rebuilding or exchanging new or used weighing or measuring  
5 devices shall, within ten days of making such repair, ex-  
6 change, sale or rebuilding, furnish the sealer within whose  
7 jurisdiction such device is located with the name and address  
8 of the person into whose possession such device was delivered.  
9 Whoever violates any provision of this section shall be  
10 punished for the first offense by a fine of not less than fifty  
11 dollars, for the second offense by a fine of not less than one  
12 hundred dollars and for a subsequent offense by a fine of not  
13 less than five hundred dollars.

The Constitution of the United States

In the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty

the first of the amendments to the Constitution of the United States was adopted by the States on the 25th day of September, 1789, and the same were ratified by the States on the 25th day of September, 1791, and the same are now in full force and effect.

It is enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States in Congress assembled, that the following amendments to the Constitution of the United States be and the same are hereby enacted as amendments to the said Constitution:

1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.
2. The Senate shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature of the State for which they are so chosen, and they shall hold their Offices for six Years, and until their Successors be chosen.
3. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States; and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
4. No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of twenty five Years, and seven Years, and who, when elected, shall have been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who, when elected, shall be, when elected, an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.
5. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
6. The House of Representatives shall choose their Speaker and other Officers; and they shall meet in one City, which shall not be removed from one State to another.
7. The Senate shall choose their President and Vice President, and they shall hold their Offices for five Years, and until their Successors be chosen.
8. The President and Vice President shall hold their Offices for four Years, and until their Successors be chosen.
9. The President shall be elected by the Electors in each State, and the Electors shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
10. The President shall have the Power to fill up Vacancies that may happen during his Term, by appointing and by removing his Officers.
11. The President shall have the Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for all Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.
12. The President shall have the Power to make Treaties, provided he shall have the Consent of the Senate and two thirds of the whole Number of Members.
13. The President shall have the Power to nominate and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to appoint and to remove his Officers.
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
