HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, June 5, 1969.

The committee on Transportation, to whom were referred the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1801) of Patrick H. Harrington, Jr., and John J. Long that the Department of Public Works be directed to erect and maintain directional signs on Route 24 and on Route 195 providing directions for motorists traveling to the site of the World War II memorial at Battleship Cove; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 3842) of Michael Paul Feeney, M. Joseph Manning and Joseph J. Semensi that the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority be prohibited from constructing or expanding rapid transit lines or repair yards or car barns within one mile of Mattapan Square in the city of Boston; and the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4584) of Raymond F. Rourke that provision be made for transportation facilities and services coordinated with highway systems and urban development plans in certain areas throughout the Commonwealth, report the accompanying order (House, No. 5339).

1 *Ordered*, That the committee on Transportation be autho-
2 nized to sit during the recess of the General Court for the
3 purpose of making an investigation and study of the subject
4 matter of current house documents numbered 1801, to pro-
5 vide directional signs to Battleship Cove, the location of the
6 commonwealth's World War II Memorial; 3842, prohibiting
7 the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority from con-
8 structing or expanding a rapid transit line or repair yards or
9 car barns within one mile of Mattapan square; of the
10 investigation and study proposed by current house document
11 numbered 4584, to provide and maintain Massachusetts
12 transportation facilities and services coordinated with high-
13 way systems and urban development plans in certain areas
14 throughout the commonwealth.

15 Said committee shall be provided with quarters in the state
16 house or elsewhere, may hold public hearings, may travel
17 within the commonwealth, and may expend for clerical and
18 other services and expenses such sums as may be appro-
19 priated therefor. Said committee shall report to the general
20 court the results of its investigation and study, and its
21 recommendations, if any, together with drafts of legislation
22 necessary to carry such recommendations into effect, by filing
23 the same with the clerk of the house of representatives on or
24 before the last Wednesday of January, nineteen hundred and
25 seventy.
