AN ACT PERMITTING CERTAIN SELECTIVE INMATES TO BE AUTHORIZED TO ADDRESS CIVIC ORGANIZATIONS FOR THE PURPOSE OF CIVIC INTEREST IN RELATION TO PREVENTING CRIME AND JUVENILE DELINQUENCY.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 127 of the General Laws is hereby amended by
2 inserting after section 86G the following section: —

3 *Section 86H.* The commissioner shall be authorized to allow
4 selected inmates to leave the confinement of a correctional
5 institution of the commonwealth, in the custody of an
6 employee, for the purpose of addressing civic organizations in
7 relation to seeking civic interest in the work of the department
8 and correctional institutions of the commonwealth and in
9 relation to preventing crime and juvenile delinquency.
