AN ACT FURTHER PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF INTEREST ON SECURITY DEPOSITS HELD BY THE LANDLORD IN EXCESS OF ONE YEAR.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The provisions of chapter 666 of the acts of
2 1970 shall apply to security deposits received before January 1,
3 1971, but a landlord shall not be liable for interest which
4 would have been accrued before September 1, 1972.

1 SECTION 2. Section 2 of chapter 666 of the acts of 1970 is
2 hereby amended by striking out all after the word "seventy-
3 one."
