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## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Two.

AN ACT EXTENDING UNDER CERTAIN LIMITED CIRCUMSTANCES THE APPLICABILITY OF CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF ZONING ORDINANCES AND BYLAWS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Section 7A of chapter 40A of the General Laws is hereby  
2 further amended by inserting, after the second paragraph, the  
3 following paragraph: —

4 In the event that any lot shown on a plan bearing an  
5 endorsement by the planning board is, after the date of such  
6 endorsement, the subject matter of any appeal to a board of  
7 appeals or of litigation involving a municipal board or officer,  
8 the exemptive provisions of the foregoing paragraphs shall be  
9 extended for a period equal to that from the date of initiation  
10 of either or both the appeal and the litigation to the date of  
11 final disposition thereof provided final adjudication in such  
12 proceedings is in favor of the owner of the lot.
