By Mr. Hatch of Beverly, petition of Francis W. Hatch, Jr., relative to permitting hunting on Sundays. Natural Resources and Agriculture.

AN ACT ALLOWING SUNDAY HUNTING.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 57 of chapter 131 of the General Laws as amended
2 is hereby amended by striking out the first paragraph and
3 inserting in place thereof the following paragraph: —

4 No person shall hunt on Sunday except between one o'clock
5 postmeridian and sunset during the period commencing with
6 the second Sunday of December and ending with the beginning
7 of the close season. No person on Sundays during open season
8 shall before one o'clock postmeridian or after sunset hunt any
9 bird or mammal of any kind or carry upon his person a rifle or
10 shotgun before one o'clock postmeridian or after sunset in any
11 place where birds or mammals might be found.

The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 1, Clause 1: All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Article II, Section 1, Clause 1: The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America.

Article III, Section 1, Clause 1: The judicial Power shall be vested in one Supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish.

Article IV, Section 1, Clause 1: Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State.

Article V, Section 1, Clause 1: The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses present, or two thirds of a majority of all the States present, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, which, when ratified by three fourths of all the States, shall be valid, as part of the Constitution.

Article VI, Section 1, Clause 1: This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof, and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land.
