AN ACT FURTHER REGULATING THE ISSUANCE OF GUN PERMITS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Any person applying for a gun permit shall have had educa-
2 tion and training in the use and handling of firearms. This
3 education and training shall have been given by a qualified
4 instructor. Before the person applying for this permit is given
5 one, he shall take an examination in the use of firearms, which
6 shall include the handling of firearms. If the applicant cannot
7 pass this examination, he shall be required to get further
8 instruction before the permit is issued.
