AN ACT PROVIDING TENURE FOR THE INCUMBENT OF THE OFFICE OF EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT IN THE YOUTH SERVICE DEPARTMENT.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in
General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as
follows:*

1 Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, the
2 tenure of the present incumbent of the office of the executive
3 assistant in the department of youth service shall be unlimited
4 unless incapacitated by physical or mental disability from per-
5 forming the duties thereof, but he may be removed therefrom
6 for cause after hearing in the manner provided by section
7 forty-three of chapter thirty-one of the General Laws.
