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## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Two.

### AN ACT INCREASING THE SALARY OF THE CLERK OF THE SUPREME JUDICIAL COURT.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter 221 of the General Laws is hereby amended by  
2 striking out section 93, as most recently amended by section 1  
3 of chapter 743 of the acts of 1960, and inserting in place  
4 thereof the following section: —  
5 *Section 93.* The clerk of the supreme judicial court shall  
6 receive from the commonwealth as salary a sum equivalent to  
7 eighty-five per cent of the salary of an associate justice of the  
8 supreme judicial court. Said clerk may employ necessary cleri-  
9 cal assistance, and may expend for said purpose such sums as  
10 may be appropriated therefor, subject, however, to the  
11 approval of the chief justice.

## The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 2, Clause 3

IN ALL CASES ARISING UNDER THIS CONSTITUTION OR UNDER THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES

It is enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Congress assembled, that for the purpose of the said clause

1. That the House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
2. No Person shall be Representative who shall not, when elected, have seven Years Residence in the United States, and, when elected, be seven Years a Citizen thereof; but no Person shall be Representative who shall not, when elected, have been seven Years a Citizen of the State in which he shall be chosen.
3. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
4. No State shall have less Representatives than three; but no State shall have more than three as large a Number as the most numerous State shall have.
5. The House of Representatives shall choose their Speaker and other Officers; and they shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.
6. The House of Representatives may, by a two thirds Vote, remove any Officer appointed or elected by the People, or by any State Legislature, or by the Electors in any State, for Misconduct in Office.
7. The House of Representatives may, by a two thirds Vote, expel any Member for Misconduct.
8. The House of Representatives may, by a two thirds Vote, suspend any Member for Misconduct, but no Suspension shall affect the Powers and Duties of that Member in any other Part of this Constitution.
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
