## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Two.

### AN ACT INCREASING COMPULSORY BODILY INJURY MOTOR VEHICLE LIABILITY LIMITS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. The definition "motor vehicle liability bond"  
2 in section 34A of chapter 90 of the General Laws is hereby  
3 amended by striking out the words "five thousand" and "ten  
4 thousand", in lines twenty-two, and twenty-four, and inserting  
5 in place thereof the words: — "twenty thousand" and "forty  
6 thousand."

1 SECTION 2. The definition of "motor vehicle liability  
2 policy" in section 34A of chapter 90 of the General Laws is  
3 hereby amended by striking out the words "five thousand" and  
4 "ten thousand" in lines twenty-one and twenty-three and in-  
5 serting in place thereof the words: — "twenty thousand" and  
6 "forty thousand."

By the House of Representatives, passed at the City of Washington, this 1st day of March, 1887.

The Constitution of the United States

is the law of the land; and no State shall make any law which shall infringe the rights secured by it.

SECTION 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

SECTION 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People in each State, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

SECTION 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for a Term of six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

SECTION 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of Elections.
